

The **toxic stress** of poverty is the biggest barrier to learning for kids in need.



of educators report that inadequate access to mental and emotional health support impacts kids' learning

of educators report that they could have a greater impact if they had the right resources Meeting basic human needs would have the greatest impact on students' learning potential.

Rural and urban communities face many of the same challenges.

Educators cited a lack of family engagement as a top barrier to learning, but they also indicated they are focusing less on family engagement and more on classroom success.

50 selected "encourage reading/learning in the home" as an objective in 2019, vs. 56% in 2018 and 64% in 2017 66%

In many cases, educators prioritize professional development over funding.

Creating a school library is, in many cases, **innovative**.

Emerging Trend: Kids don't see themselves as learners.

Educators reported that kids often don't see themselves as learners because education is not viewed as essential in their homes.

Educators want to add their voice to a movement.

NEARLY 1/3
of educators in the First Book Network say that they joined to "become part of a movement that promotes equal access to quality education for kids in need." More and more educators indicate their school or community has no library.

*These learnings are compiled from multiple surveys fielded in 2019 and are based on survey samples that are representative of the First Book Network in terms of organization type, job title, geographic setting, etc. Some learnings are from qualitative research rather than quantitative.
